

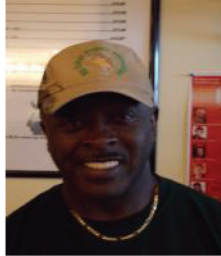

Baked Walleye Recipe

Ingredients

Original recipe makes 4 servings

- 2 eggs
- 1 tablespoon water
- 1/3 cup dry bread crumbs
- 1/3 cup instant mashed potato flakes
- 1/3 cup grated Parmesan cheese
- 1 teaspoon seasoned salt
- 4 (4 ounce) fillets walleye

Directions

Preheat an oven to 450 degrees F (230 degrees C). Grease a baking sheet. Beat the eggs and water together in a bowl until smooth; set aside. Combine the bread crumbs, potato flakes, and Parmesan cheese in a separate bowl with the seasoned salt until evenly mixed. Dip the walleye fillets into the beaten egg, then press into the bread crumb mixture. Place onto the prepared baking sheet. Bake in the preheated oven until the fish is opaque in the center and flakes easily with a fork, 15 to 20 minutes.

On a beautiful day in June, at the wolf river, in Winneconne Wisconsin, Kingfish, Paul Goosby and I, along with two other fishermen, Michael Miller, and Deacon Stanley Nevels, were in hot pursuit of anything that we could catch, on our hooks, that afternoon. I had just gotten my new portable Bottom-line fish finder, and I was sweating to use it. We had heard that if we took our boat down by the electrical line that hanged about 25 feet above us, north of the bridge that we might find some fish to catch. The Wolf River is known for Walleyes, Catfish, Bass, Crappies, and of course sheep-heads (known as silver Bass), among every other species of fish. I had been to the Wolf River several times, and I would always catch something, but on this trip the fish were hard to find. Then finally as we approached our destination, I could mark fish on my fish finder, so everyone started casting their rods, and catching fish. It is a wonderful joy for everyone in the boat to catch fish, and we were just having great fun. After about an hour or so, we started to run low on fish bait, so all of us agree, to head backward towards the bait shop before it closes. We had some 4-pound flathead Catfishes, a Channel catfish, about 15 Perches, a couple of Wall-eyes, and about 10 or 12 nice size Silver Bass in our fish baskets, and we were ready to get to the bait shop and get to our spot. As we uplift the Anchor, Mike asked if we should pull the fish basket back into the boat, and one of our guys said no, that it should be safe in the

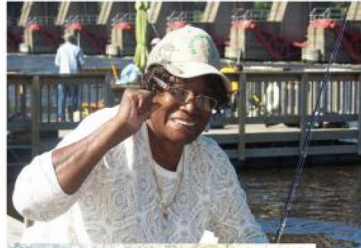
water. Paul started up our motor on the boat, and before we took off well, the fish basket snapped loose from the boat, and we lost our catch for the day. The look on everybody faces, as we could not believe it, was dull, and quiet as we drift in wonderment for about ten minutes. Then suddenly we try every trick in the book to shag our fish basket to no avail. Our basket was forever lost in 16 feet of water. We went back to shore, to the bait shop, and the owner asked us how did we do out on the river, and we told him our story and he at this moment burst into an uncontrollably laughed. We were so heartbroken that we fished from the shore the rest of the evening and night trying to make up our catch. As we sat there fishing, on the shore, the only African American guys at the resort, a boat of a fisherman, would drift by and asked, "who's in command of the fish basket?" and suddenly a roar of laughter would come out of nowhere. We could do nothing but join in the laughter and enjoy the moment.

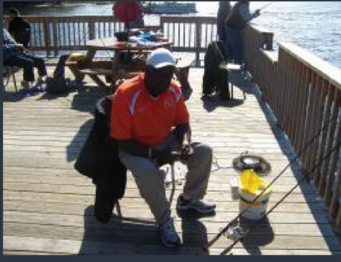
